Insurance Coverage through MAXIA Available to MPAA Members

Mennonite Property Aid Association (MPAA) members were notified in late August that the MPAA Board of Directors made the decision to cease providing protection in Colorado, the only remaining MPAA state.

MPAA is an organization that provides protection to its members from property losses in adherence to the longstanding belief of brother helping brother or “mutual aid.” In order to continue serving its members, MPAA joined with nine other like minded organizations across North America to form MutualAid eXchange (MAX). However, at this time, MAX is not licensed in Colorado and won’t be in the foreseeable future.

While MPAA members will receive a non-renewal notice for their current MPAA agreement, the agency affiliate of MAX, MAX Insurance Agency, Inc. (MAXIA), is licensed in Colorado and is able to provide a variety of insurance coverages and offer multi-policy discounts along with mutual aid support at the time of a claim.

Just as MPAA, MAXIA is part of the “MAX[®] family of companies” and members will still benefit from the same mission to create and sustain wholeness through preserving and restoring property, lives and communities. Besides the high quality insurance products for homes, farms, churches and small businesses, another component of the MAX family is the Mutual Aid Ministries program. Mutual Aid Ministries provide physical, emotional and spiritual support above and beyond the insurance policy. This includes the MAX Share Fund, Inc., a not-for-profit organization that often partners with the local church to meet special needs.

Dave Wine, President and CEO of both MAX and MAXIA, commented that, “We deeply appreciate the commitment our MPAA members have had with us and truly feel that this new arrangement will provide them with even better service and protection, and also keep them a part of the greater Anabaptist mutual aid community.”
